# President's Message

Steve Baker OYSA President I write my report this year after an interesting year in Soccer in our country, and a challenging and productive year for Oregon Youth Soccer. I'll start with an overview that I believe shows your input to us.

OYSA is a service partner for all of our clubs, players, administrator and parents. Over the last 5 years we have been more concerned with player membership and becoming financially stable. Last AGM you voted to increase membership dues. As you can see from our financials this boost and improved financial management has meant we have put money in both the insurance and reserve accounts.

Soon after the AGM there were multiple questions coming to the board, leading for us to having an open house Q&A session. Questions were varied – from our relationship with the Timbers/ Thorns, financials, leagues, State Cup, ODP and recreational play. As a result of this we formed board sub-committees to review goals and vision in the areas of ODP, Leagues, Club Formation and Recreational Club/Team support. Obviously these are not all areas that need to be covered, but were the top four for 2017.

For those who attended the President's meeting you will have seen my presentation – these slides will be available on our website.

Now I want to put some perspectives of how changes in the game continue to affect our association.

Let's first look at the National level.

With the US Men's National Team's loss there have been quotes that this has "set the sport of soccer in America back decades". There are potentially 8 candidates (they have not all been confirmed at the time of drafting this report) running for President of USSF and calls for the current President to resign – which he will not do. So what is the real impact on us? In multiple national meetings this year – both USSF and USYS, it is clear that USSF is going to invest more and more in youth. While there are abilities for grants at all levels the continued drive is the support/push of Development Academies, now for both girls and boys.

From my viewpoint this will become the highest level of play in the State over the next 3-5 years. We need to be dynamic in terms of league and cup play as the playing field changes both with our competitive leagues and cups, but also with how the Olympic Development Program will fit into the hierarchy. Both the ODP and the League committees took this into consideration.

Now let's look at the Timbers/Thorns relationships and their impact on us.

The Timbers loss to Houston was gut wrenching. The Thorns win over North Carolina was a night for celebration. But our relationship is more than watching these and the T2 team play. We have an ongoing contract that both sides are actively working on to produce mutual benefit. This year we have increased the level of reporting and feedback from the Timbers/Thorns and have increased the number of our face to face meetings. We have also migrated all league management into our office, while ODP is still under the day to day tactical running by the Timbers/Thorns.

So where are most of our players?

They are not playing in ODP, the DA or even in our competitive teams. Our strength is our recreational players and we must remind ourselves of that on a regular basis. Both the Club Formation and Recreational sub-committees have worked hard to remind the whole board of this fact. As many of you know I have a background in mainly recreational soccer and have seen how it can develop players into young adults who can go forward into the world – and not all play for an MLS team. While the National team issues may make short term headlines, the growth of soccer in our state and our country is dependent on a strong and well supported recreational program.

I could not do this job without the support of both our staff and board. Theirs is not always an easy task and in some cases can be very disheartening. Of course there is always a game to watch a player at whatever level who makes you smile – this is why we do what we do.

Lastly, let me reiterate that we are a service organization that is here for you. We need your input and support if we are all to be successful. Please contact us with questions, concerns or even better – ways we could improve this great game.

# **Executive Director Message**

#### Members,

2017 was a monumental year of positive change within the Oregon Youth Soccer Association organization. I am extremely proud of the strides that the OYSA team has made to better serve our membership. This group of professionals cares deeply about the game of soccer, the quality of club relationships and most importantly about the 50,000+ youngsters playing soccer in Oregon.

I would like to highlight some of the 2017 accomplishments for you:

Possibly, the most successful achievement of last year has been financial solvency. Through cost saving measures, micro-managing budgets and controlling operational spending OYSA finished the year "in the black" for the first time in over three years all while providing what I consider better service to our members than ever before.

On the personnel side we were able to add a "Manager of Leagues and Tournaments". This has equipped us to be proactive in club relations during the three big competitive seasons and cup tournaments. Jose Campos who has filled this position brings a lifetime of soccer experience to the role and is fluent in Spanish which allows us to converse with many more club members. We are currently working on the first OYSA Futsal Tournament and League and a Recreational Tournament in May.

While we continue our contractual obligations with our current partners (Dick's Team Sports HQ, Adidas, Portland Timbers/Thorns, Sports Pins and Gear FC,) we have signed an agreement with Chipotle Restaurants (who is now our official food provider) and Positive Coaching Alliance. These new partnerships allow us to offer a vast array of workshops that will benefit our clubs and how they interact with our players, parents and coaches. We are extremely excited about these new alliances.

I have implemented changes in the internal structure of our operation. Many people do not know that we accomplish all that we do with a staff of only five full time staff and one-part time position. In Q1, 2018 I have implemented a search for a "Director of Soccer Development" to oversee coaching education, player development and club membership. My goal is to announce the new hire in February.

Lastly, we continue to strive every day to better serve our member clubs. Service is a word that is often used as a cliché for justifying a certain level of quality in interaction with customers by a business. Every member of the OYSA team believes that providing exceptional service is mandatory and a privilege.

2017 proved that no matter what topic that we all approached as a group, in every decision the result was absolutely in the best interest of the children playing the sport that we all love.

I am proud to be the Executive Director of the Oregon Youth Soccer Association and I want to thank you, our member clubs, for the support that you have extended to me over my first year in the job. I, along with the rest of the OYSA team and our Board of Directors are extremely exited for 2018 and what lies ahead.

# **Member Services Report**

Member Services is dedicated to identifying and responding to the needs of clubs and their members. For most clubs this involves referee and player development opportunities, inter and intra club grievance resolution and assisting with issues such as club legal challenges, bylaw and/or policy revisions, and risk management. In addition to serving member clubs, the department has been involved in the operation of sponsored leagues and tournaments. Member Services is also responsible for assisting the OYSA Vice President to manage OYSA disciplinary hearings.

Maintaining frequent contact with our member clubs is an essential activity of Member Services so OYSA can be aware of and respond to the changing business and programmatic landscape that confronts our clubs throughout our state. Last year we aided in establishing new clubs, assisted several groups to understand the process of establishing a club, assisted existing clubs with bylaw reviews and other governance issues and assisted in resolving a number of disputes and grievances.

The Member Services Department has made available on our website documents to assist new clubs as well as existing clubs with bylaws, policies, and risk management. The department will continue to develop manuals to supplement policies for discipline and membership. The goals for manual development are to streamline procedures and make guidance more easily accessible to our members.

#### Soccer Across America

Soccer Across America has a goal to bring soccer to all children regardless of where they live. The program is dedicated to creating new soccer clubs and providing playing opportunities to children in under served and un-served soccer areas throughout the state. US Youth Soccer has suspended grants due to their budgetary constraints. While OYSA has continued to assist new club development, we have been unable to provide direct financial support to new clubs.

#### **US Soccer Federation Player Development Initiative**

The US Soccer Federation adopted and circulated to its members a plan for developing youth players that standardizes playing formats and rules. The initiative also changes the basis for determining a player's registration age to the calendar year of birth rather than the player's age at the beginning of the soccer seasonal year. The Federation's plan was released as a recommendation for the 16-17 year and mandatory beginning in fall 2017. OYSA and all other USYS State Associations decided it would be better to implement the change in fall 2016 than to wait until fall 2017.

Birth year registration changed how a player's age is calculated and reported to USSF. It did not, however, require a change in the way that teams are formed. USYS competitions, including the state part of the USYS National Championships and the National Presidents Cup, competitive leagues, and other tournaments that group teams by age began using age based on the year of birth to establish a team's age from 9/1/2016. Recreational competitions were allowed to group teams by their players' grade in school, if they wished to do so. The majority of OYSA's recreational leagues chose to use grade in school as the basis for creating groups of teams to play against each other. Competitive clubs that chose to form teams entirely by age faced some challenges as teams formed from players that had previously been put together largely by grade now have players divided between grades.

Game formats for U12 and younger are now established by the Federation as 4v4 for age 8 and younger, 7v7 for ages 9 and 10, and 9v9 for ages 11 and 12. The player development initiative includes specifications for field and goal sizes as well as modifications to the Laws of the Game to be age appropriate. OYSA adopted the recommendations for all leagues and tournaments it sponsored. Member clubs were informed of the changes as well as the requirement for the changes to be in place for all sanctioned leagues and tournaments beginning 9/1/2017. Many clubs made the transition in 16-17 and the others will make the transition for the 17-18 year.

### **LEAGUES AND TOURNAMENTS**

During 2016-2017 OYSA organized and administered:

- Sanctioning of member club leagues and tournaments
- Out-of-State and international team travel approval
- All player, coach and administrator registration
- Team eligibility for the US Youth Soccer National Championship Series and the US Youth Soccer Regional and National Presidents Cup
- A development league for U9 and U10 players
- Leagues and tournaments in cooperation with the Portland Timbers.

#### **RECREATIONAL LEAGUES**

#### **OYSA U9-U10 Developmental League**

Oregon Youth Soccer operated the OYSA Developmental League for U9 and U10 teams in the Portland Metro area who are looking for additional competition to develop individual skills within a team environment. All games are played on Sundays at Delta Park. Games are played in a 7v7 format on the synthetic turf fields with properly sized fields and goals. The league offers flexible rostering that allows clubs to move players between their teams in the same age group as player development dictates. All players are classified as recreational and the league does not publish results or standings. Modified rules promote building up play from the back and keeping the ball on the ground. The league fully implemented the Federation's PDI standards for 7v7 play. This also included dropping the U8 age groups to remain in compliance with PDI standards.

The fall 2016 developmental league had 121 teams participate. While this was a 14 team reduction from the 135 teams in fall 2015, 11 of the teams in 2015 were in the U8 age group, an age not included in fall 2016. There were 134 teams playing in spring 2017. This was a 21 team reduction from the 155 teams participating in the 2016 spring developmental league, but 17 of the spring 2016 teams were U8 and that age group was removed from the league in 16-17.

#### COMPETITIVE

During the 2016-2017 fiscal year Oregon Youth Soccer continued to build on its partnership with the Portland Timbers and Thorns to operate leagues and tournaments for all levels of competition. The Portland Timbers and Thorns leagues offered play from U11 through U19 for both boys and girls. The leagues offered multiple divisions in each age group to give teams the opportunity to play similar teams.

### **RESULTS in EVENTS Managed with the Portland Timbers and Thorns**

#### Fall – 2016 Leagues

The Timbers and Thorns presented their first fall season with OYSA in 2014. The fall 2014 leagues provided play for a total of 284 teams across all age groups and divisions. The fall 2015 leagues increased significantly to 505 teams in all age groups combined. The increased number of teams allowed for a better competitive balance among the teams. Participation continued to be strong in fall 2016 as 574 teams registered for league play.

Fall leagues offered play for U11 through U19 boys and U11 through U15 girls. The U15 age group was made a part of the fall league for both boys and girls to be sure that players classified as age 15 under the new USSF age standards, but were still in 8<sup>th</sup> grade, would have a place to play during the fall. There were 34 U15 boys teams and 26 U15 girls teams entered in the 2016 fall Timbers and Thorns leagues.

### 2016 Founders Cup

The Portland Timbers and Thorns presented a Founders Cup, managed by OYSA, for the first time in fall 2015. The Founders cup was presented for a second time in Fall 2016. The tournament is targeted at U11-U15 teams primarily playing in Division 2 of the fall leagues and any recreational teams that wants to challenge themselves against competitive teams.

For the 2016 tournament the U15 age group was added to give lower division U15 teams from the fall league a season-ending tournament option. The tournament proved to be popular with 148 teams entered, an 80% increase from the 82 teams that entered the tournament in 2015. Here are the results of that tournament.

2016 Founders Cup Results

#### 16-17 Oregon Presidents Cup – Presented by the Timbers (boys) and Thorns (girls)

The Oregon Presidents Cup is the state level of the US Youth Soccer National Presidents Cup tournament. It is intended for non-premier, competitive level U11-U19 teams. The 16-17 Oregon Presidents Cup tournament began in November 2016 with play for U11-U14 teams. The U11 and U12 teams played to finals and the U13 and U14 teams played to determine the semifinalists.

Because USYS adopted the Federation's birth year registration changes beginning with the 16-17 year, the tournament made a change to the tournament's oldest age group. The oldest age group in the 16-17 tournament was a 17/18 group that allowed players born in 1999 who turned 18 on or after 8/1/2016 to be included with the players born in 2000. Without the age adjustment, many of the players and teams that played Presidents Cup as U16 players in 15-16 would have been too old to participate. As a result, the Oregon Presidents Cup combined the U17 and U18 ages into a single U18 group. This age group adjustment applies only to the 16-17 year. The tournament will be played in 17-18 based on strict calendar year age groups.

U15-U19 teams began their participation in the tournament in April 2017. The Oregon Presidents Cup completed play April 30<sup>th</sup>. A total of 241 teams participated in the Oregon Presidents Cup during the 16-17 year.

The Oregon Presidents Cup is an open tournament for any age-eligible teams that are 100% registered with OYSA prior to the beginning of the tournament. Finals for U13-U19 were played April 30<sup>th</sup> at Buckman Field Park in Portland and the Tualatin Hills Rec Center in Beaverton. The Champions of the U13 - U17/18 age groups were eligible to advance to the Region IV Presidents Cup Tournament, which was held in Salt Lake City, Utah June 12-18, 2017.

### **Region IV Presidents Cup – 2017**

The US Youth Soccer Presidents Cup is designed for those teams seeking additional challenges to play against teams of similar abilities for a regional and/or a national title. The cup provides a progressive, competitive experience to teams that might not otherwise get the opportunity to participate in a series of unique experiences highlighting competition, camaraderie and community at the state, regional, and national levels of US

Youth Soccer. Regional qualifiers, known as US Youth Soccer Regional Presidents Cup events, determine the teams competing in the National Presidents Cup and feature boys and girls teams in the 13U through 17U age groups.

US Youth Soccer changed its age group designations from Under NN (*e.g.*, U13) to NN and under (*e.g.*, 13U). The change is intended to more clearly indicate that a player's age is the group age, or younger (*e.g.*, 13 and under). The USYS age designation is used for the regional tournament results.

**Oregon State Cup – 2017 – Presented by the Timbers (boys) and Thorns (girls)** The Oregon State Cup Presented by the Timbers (boys) and Thorns (girls) is the state level of competition in the US Youth Soccer National Championship Series. Games were played in April and May with the finals on May 7, 2016.

USYS adopted the Federation's birth year registration changes beginning with the 16-17 year. As a result the tournament made a change to the tournament's oldest age group. The oldest age group in the 16-17 tournament was a 19/20 group that allowed players born in 1997 who turned 20 on or after 8/1/2016 to be included with the players born in 1998. Without the age adjustment, many of the players and teams that played State Cup as U18 players in 15-16 would have been too old to participate. The age adjustment applies only to the 16-17 year. The tournament to be played in 17-18 will be based on strict calendar year age groups.

The US Youth Soccer National Championship Series is the country's most prestigious national youth soccer tournament, providing approximately 185,000 players on over

10,000 teams from US Youth Soccer State Associations the opportunity to showcase their soccer skills against the best competition in the nation while emphasizing teamwork, discipline and fair play.

The US Youth Soccer National Championships cap a year long series of competitions for boys and girls teams in multiple age brackets as teams earn their way from the top teams in their state to the regional championship tournaments. US Youth Soccer State Champions and selected wildcard teams from US Youth Soccer Regional Leagues in most age groups are eligible to compete in one of four US Youth Soccer Regional Championships. The champions in the U13 through U19 age brackets from each of the four regional events plus four teams from the US Youth Soccer National League in the U14-U18 age groups converge in July for the US Youth Soccer National Championships.

The US Youth Soccer National Championship Series annually provides the nation's top collegiate coaches with the premier stage to identify and scout the most coveted players in the country.

# **Treasurer Report**

**Keith Blackerby** 

The accounting firm of Gary McGee & Co. performed a financial review of the Oregon Youth Soccer Association's financial records as of June 30, 2017. The review includes primarily applying analytical procedures to management's financial data and making inquiries of organization management. The final report dated December 11, 2017 finds "Based on our review, we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying consolidated financial statements in order for them to be in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States."

The financial statements reflect the consolidated results of Oregon Youth Soccer Association (OYSA) and Oregon Youth Soccer Foundation (OYSF). For the year ending June 30, 2017, our net assets increased by \$227,907. Our 2017-2018 Budget was prepared with a projected operating profit of \$16,183.

OYSA prepares a profit and loss statement, balance sheet and bank reconciliation each month, which are regularly reviewed by the Finance Committee. The Finance Committee then reports significant results to the Oregon Youth Soccer Association's Board of Directors. Further, a quarterly report is prepared for the Finance Committee, detailing budgetary variances.

The Finance Committee meets as needed to review and approve the annual budget, review financial records and assess fiduciary responsibility. The committee reviews financial reports and develops clear and concise reporting strategies for the board and Oregon Youth Soccer Association records.
